CON STATEMENT

Just before I was elected to the party's National Committee, I made one single promise to the assembled convention delegation: that I would give my all to building this organization into the real political party that I know it can be and that we so desperately need. I take this responsibility very seriously.

My local comrades will attest to my dedication and professionalism. My goal is to continue to do this work locally and to enable others to do so nationally. The behavior of those behind this referendum stands in the way. Which is best for the party?
